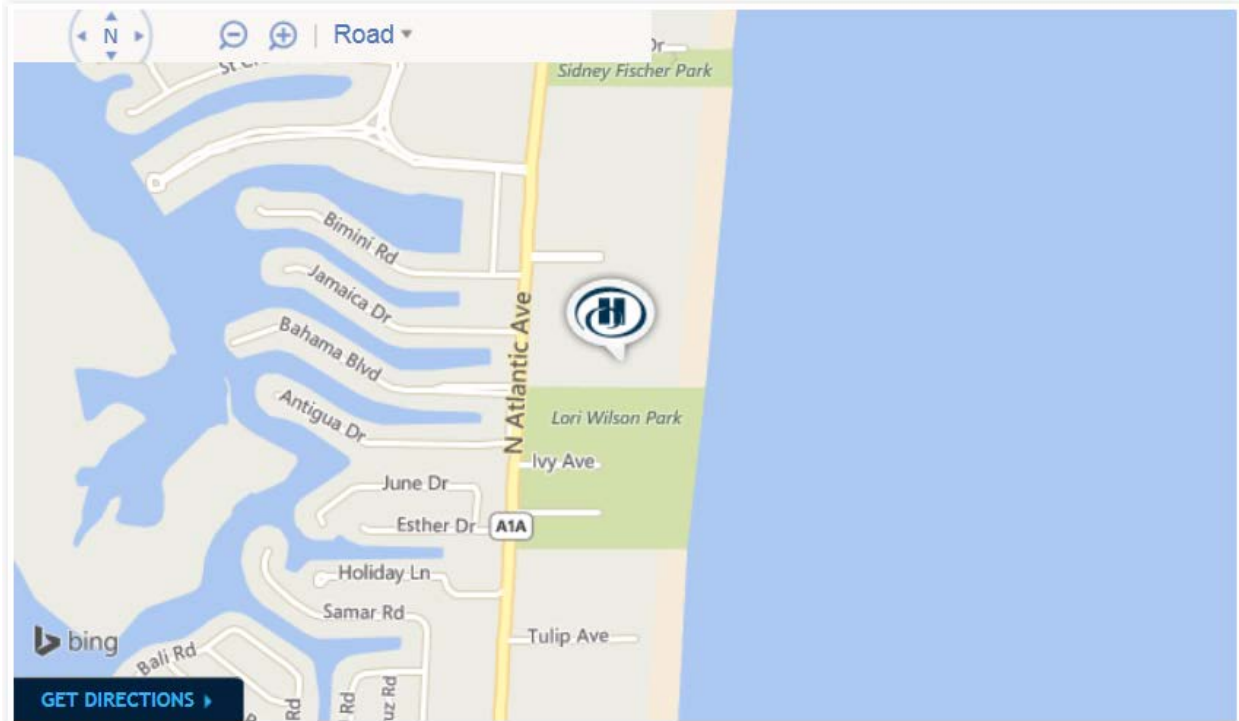


Directions to the Hilton Cocoa Beach



From Orlando: take SR 528 East for 45 miles. The same road becomes A1A South at Port Canaveral. Continue south on A1A for 5 miles through the town of Cape Canaveral and into Cocoa Beach. The hotel is on the left side.

From Port Canaveral Cruise Terminal: Head north towards Charles M Rowland Dr. and turn right. Turn left onto FL-401 N. Take the ramp on the left onto A1A and continue for 6 miles. Hotel will be on the left side.

Traveling south on I95: take exit 205 onto SR 528 East and continue as above.

Traveling north on I95: take exit 188 Pineda Causeway, left on A1A. Hotel is about 8.8 miles on the right.

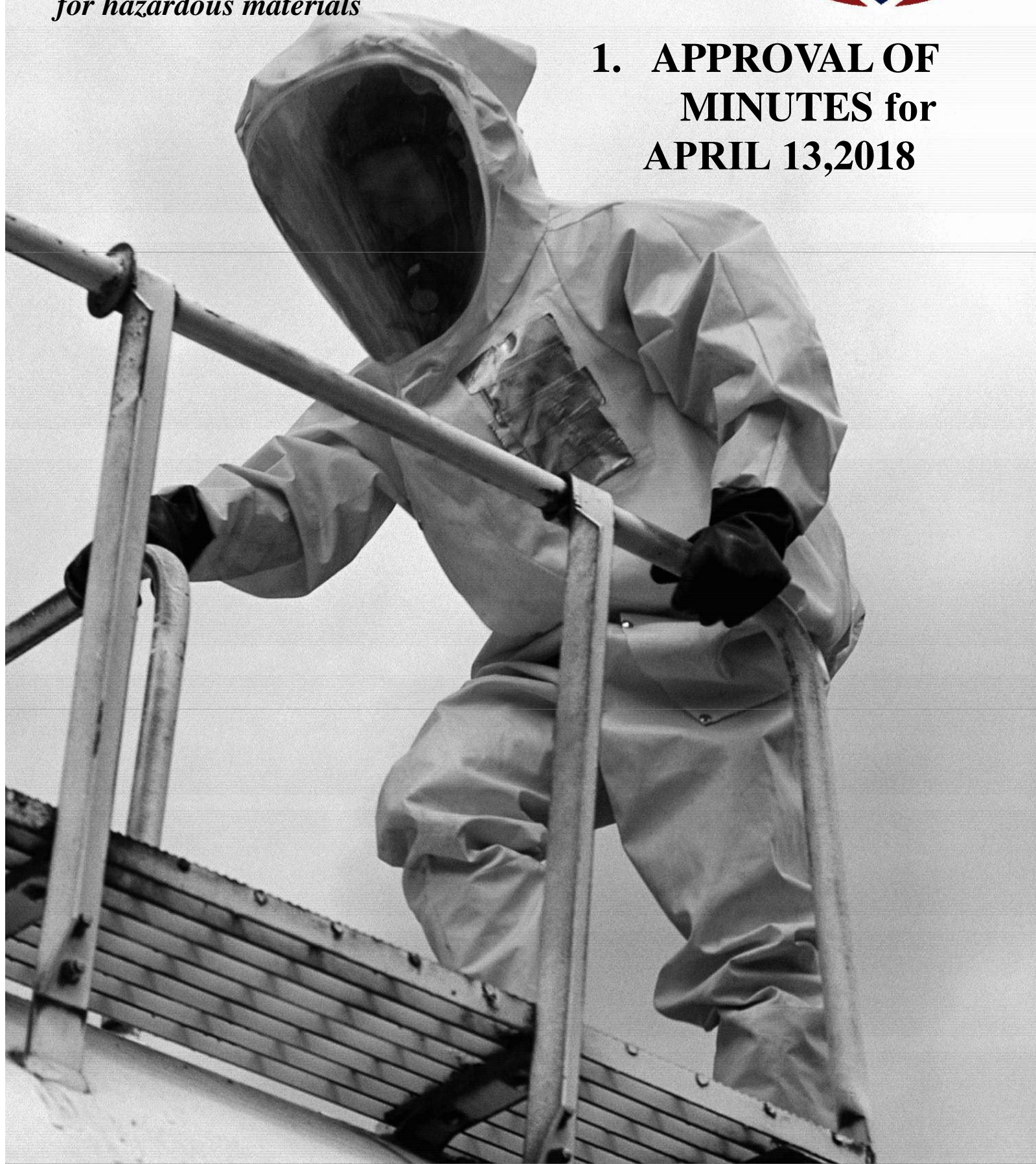





The West Florida Local Emergency Planning Committee (WFLEPC) met on Wednesday, April 25, in Okaloosa County, FL. Topics discussed included a recap of the TTF and SERC meetings in Daytona Beach, FL; holding a Hazmat Awareness Month versus the traditional week in order to reach all seven counties and also incorporate a back to school theme; revisions to the Emergency Response Plan; the HMEP planning project; and Supplemental Environmental Projects (SEPs).

Members also discussed the Hazards Analysis program at length including the intended purpose for the program: verification of chemicals/ amounts. The committee discussed a desire to use taxpayer dollars wisely in conducting the program to ensure the visits are producing timely, useful information. Suggestions included coordinating with the first responders that also conduct HAS monthly and using E-Plan instead of CAMEO for the most current information.

160 HOUR HYBRID COURSE

The West Florida LEPC assisted with providing funding for the 160 Hour Hybrid Tech Course hosted both online and in person at the Ocean City-Wright Fire Control District in Fort Walton Beach in February and April. The instructors provide a more hands-on approach than the traditional 160-hour courses resulting in higher achievement rates. This is the second year in a row the West Florida region has conducted a 160-Hour course and boasts a 100% completion rate.

INTERNATIONAL HAZARDOUS MATERIALS CONFERENCE

The West Florida LEPC sent four first responders (two from each regional response team) to the IHM Conference in Baltimore this June utilizing HMEP training funds. Students received expert, valuable, hands-on training including biothreat response and sample collection; incident management; chemical and physical properties of hazardous materials; and recognizing and responding to commercial explosive incidents among other training.

BACK TO SCHOOL

The West Florida LEPC is incorporating a “back to school” theme in its Hazmat Awareness Month this coming August where LEPC staff and the Education and Public Awareness Subcommittee Chair will work with schools near facilities with EHS chemicals to train teachers on proper chemical sheltering in place. School districts in our region are heavily focused on active shooter response and the LEPC wants to help teachers understand the difference between the active shooter SIP and sheltering for chemical emergencies. The LEPC is working with superintendents to identify priority schools.

TRAINING

McKenzie Tank Lines, Inc. joined efforts with the West Florida LEPC to educate hazmat technicians on responding to potential extremely hazardous chemical incidents in the region. Over-the-road carriers, such as the McKenzie tankers, transporting hazardous substances are one of the greatest threats to Northwest Florida in light of I10 running through each county. McKenzie partnered with the LEPC to facilitate trainings with teams that would deploy in the event of an incident. First responders were able to train on an actual tanker, gaining valuable knowledge from McKenzie operators on sight. The efforts to educate the technicians goes a long way in keeping the public safe and is a welcomed partnership with the LEPC.

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SANTA ROSA MEDICAL CENTER CHEMICAL HAZARDS DRILL

Staff participated in an all chemical hazards first receiver response drill at the Santa Rosa Medical Center in May. Decontamination tents were stationed outside the hospital while hospital workers donned PPE and simulated first receivers responding to an incident at Whiting Field in Milton. LEPC staff and other volunteers played victims with unknown chemical burns. Following the decon drill, staff provided feedback during the after-action review.

Apalachee Local Emergency Planning Council

Serving Calhoun, Franklin, Gadsden, Gulf, Jackson, Jefferson, Liberty, Leon, and Wakulla Counties.

The Apalachee Local Emergency Planning Committee held its most recent quarterly meeting on May 10, 2018 at the Liberty County Emergency Operations Center in Bristol. This meeting discussed current LEPC business and provided an opportunity to for the members and interested parties to discuss needs, concerns and future LEPC endeavors.

The next meeting of the Apalachee LEPC is tentatively scheduled for July 2018. As always, anyone interested is welcome to attend.

The following is a summary of recent LEPC activities over the last quarter:

Hazardous Materials Training

Staff coordinated multiple 8-hour refresher courses to train over 100 City of Tallahassee employees in both Wakulla and Leon County. Also, three (3) 3-hour Response to Gasoline Tanker Incident courses were scheduled on three consecutive days to allow for various shifts of first responders to attend. There were also multiple 4-hour awareness courses held throughout the quarter. Finally, a 40-hour Technician Level Course has been scheduled for July 16-20, 2018 in Tallahassee.

Additionally, staff continues to work with the Region to host trainings for all levels of first responders to strengthen the capabilities of the Region. Staff will be meeting with the local volunteer fire departments to assess their needs and host trainings accordingly.

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HMEP Planning Project

Staff has begun planning for its comprehensive TTX for the HMEP FY 2018-19 contract. The exercise will be multi-jurisdictional in scope and will evaluate 2 functional areas of the Apalachee LEPC Regional Response Plan. The first planning meeting was held at the end of May and additional planning meetings will continue to be scheduled as the process continues.

Exercises

Staff served as the lead planner / facilitator in developing a tabletop exercise for the FSU Magnet Lab. The focus of the exercise was on responding to a hazardous materials release caused by a Hurricane directly affecting the Magnet Lab. The exercise, which took place on April 24, 2018, included participants from the Mag Lab as well as the City of Tallahassee Utility Department, Leon County Emergency Management and the Florida State University Police Department.

Outreach

Staff met with the Leon County Volunteer Fire Department Chief's and presented on the EPCRA / LEPC program. The presentation outlined what EPCRA is and what the LEPC can do for the Region when it comes to training, exercise and outreach for hazardous materials. Staff highlighted the availability of training the LEPC can provide to firefighters at all levels in an effort to promote training throughout region.

Other Staff Activities

Additionally, staff attended the Wakulla County and Leon County Build-your-bucket events on May 12, 2018 and June 2, 2018 respectively and provided a presentation / demonstration on Shelter-in-Place vs Evacuations. This was accomplished by setting up the Hazardous Materials Shelter-in-Place Doll House demonstration and providing a presentation with handouts on the importance of sheltering-in-place. Over 1,200 citizens benefited from the presentation throughout the two events.

North Central Florida Local Emergency Planning Committee

Serving Alachua, Bradford, Columbia, Dixie, Gilchrist, Hamilton, Lafayette, Levy, Madison, Suwannee, Taylor, and Union Counties

The North Central Florida Local Emergency Planning Committee last met on May 24, 2018, at the Nutrien Conference Center in White Springs (Hamilton County). Agenda items included a presentation, hazmat training, and natural gas pipelines.

Adam McCook from Nutrien, formerly known as PCS Phosphate, gave a presentation on the company's new owner and their White Springs Emergency Response Team. Skills include hazardous materials, confined space, high angle rescue, emergency medical technicians, wildland fires, and industrial fire brigades. Increased coordination with the Regional Hazmat Team was discussed.

A Technical Assistance Grant activity discussed was the distribution of 33 four-gas detectors to 12 departments to increase capabilities for responding to natural gas pipeline incidents. The idea is that firefighters in each county need be able to respond to a natural gas leak and determine if an area is vulnerable to a flammable threat. The LEPC discussed the initial Florida Pipeline Emergency Responder Initiative (PERI) meeting held in St. Augustine

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It was reported that part of the technical assistance grant is to help support the formation of a Florida PERI and that the next meeting will be held in Cocoa Beach prior to the Local Emergency Planning Council Staff and Chairs meeting.

Prior to the PERI meeting the North Central Florida Regional Team will be giving a presentation on the activities being conducted under the Pipeline Technical Assistance Grant to improve coordination between responders and pipeline operators. Many action items were identified while conducting four tabletop exercises with pipeline compressor stations. The award includes travel funds for emergency responders to attend Florida Pipeline Emergency Response Initiative meetings.

Training with the Health Care Coalitions was discussed as well as how to manage chemically contaminated victims.

Counties were asked to report on Hazardous Materials Incidents and Activities that have occurred in their counties. Columbia Counties Fire Rescue reported in attending training in Pueblo, Colorado on railcar response and said it was excellent training and recommended it. It was noted that a technician class is being conducted in Columbia County this month.

The group reviewed the hazardous materials first responders training classes that were held during the last fiscal year. Highlights include sending people to the Hazardous Materials Symposium and conducting two of the hybrid 160 hour technician classes. Remaining classes include two air monitoring classes and the first half and the online half of the technician class for Levy County.

Northeast Florida Local Emergency Planning Committee

Serving Baker, Clay, Duval, Flagler, Nassau, Putnam and St. Johns Counties

June, 2018

The quarterly meeting of the Northeast Florida Local Emergency Planning Committee was held on May 9th, 2018 at the WJCT building in Jacksonville, FL. Each meeting has been tailored around subcommittee reports on initiatives taking place at the local level, followed by presentations and discussions of a specific issue area.

The following points were topics of discussion during the May LEPC meeting.

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Chemical Releases

During this quarter, the Northeast Florida LEPC region experienced two separate chemical releases that involved different section 302 chemicals (EHS) facilities. The LEPC discussed these releases, and provided updates on the investigations that were conducted.

Gasoline Tanker Truck Emergencies

This quarter the Northeast Florida LEPC offered nine Gasoline Tanker Truck Emergency Courses. This course is designed to teach first responders how to properly identify a gasoline tanker truck and the actions they should take if they have to respond to a tanker emergency. This three hour course was provided to Clay, Putnam and St. John's counties for three consecutive days to incorporate all the personnel around the area. The NEFLLEPC will be working to bring this course to Baker, Duval and Nassau counties.

Fentanyl Safety Presentation

The Northeast Florida LEPC was given a presentation on Fentanyl Safety by Lt. Mark Rowley (Jacksonville Fire Rescue). This presentation described the dangers of fentanyl, offered insight from the medical examiner's office on how the opioid crisis is affecting Northeast Florida and highlighted a local pilot project that is showing success in treating opioid patients.

The next quarterly meeting of the LEPC will be held at the office of the Northeast Florida Regional Council in Jacksonville on **August 9, 2018**.

Completed Training:

MARCH:

On March 8th the working draft for the Okeechobee After Action Report (AAR) from Hurricane Irma was completed and briefed to the county leadership. This AAR was prepared to capture actions that had a positive effect on the response before, during and after the storm. This report will be screened by the various agencies to ensure that all pertinent data points are properly identified.

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Mr. Carter attended the Polk County Emergency Preparedness Action Committee (EPAC) meeting on March 9th at the Bartow Regional Medical Center. There was a great exchange of information between the members. On March 15th Mr. Carter attended the DeSoto County Local Mitigation Strategy (LMS) Working Group meeting at the DeSoto County Emergency Operations Center (EOC). On March 27th we held a meeting to discuss the Okeechobee County Full Scale Exercise. This exercise is moving along fairly well even after having to shut down some of the work in support of it due to extensive work during and after the hurricanes and rain bands associated with 2017 Hurricane season.

APRIL:

On April 3rd Mr. Carter observed the brief out by the DeSoto County LMS Working group to representatives of the Board of County Commissioners. Mr. Carter also attended the LMS working group meeting for Hardee County on April 11th. Following that meeting Mr. Carter traveled to St. Augustine to attend the State Emergency Response Commission (SERC) meetings. Mr. Carter, along with our Chairman, Deputy Chief Mike Linkins and our training chairman, Mr. Domenic LetoBarone attended the Training Task Force meeting and the LEPC Chair and Staff meeting. Mr. Carter conducted inspections under the Small Quantity Generators of Hazardous Waste (SQG) program from April 17th through the 19th. The input of raw data from these inspections was completed on April 24th. On the 26th we held another planning meeting targeted toward the Okeechobee full scale exercise. We received the final adjustments to the 2018 Hazardous Materials Emergency Plan and we will apply these changes next month.

MAY:

May was an extremely busy month for us here. To start with we submitted our Hazardous Materials Emergency Plan for review. As always, we have modularized our plan so that we can pull from the master plan and only submit changes or modifications. This makes the entire process go much quicker and since we know the previous edition was up to date and correct all we are interested in are those areas that have any changes. On May 4th we submitted the last of our Hazards Analysis reports to the state. On May 7th – 9th SQG inspections for Okeechobee County were completed and raw data inputs were completed in the evenings while at the Governors Hurricane Conference. Mr. Carter attended the Governor's Hurricane Conference from My 13th through the 18th. During this conference Mr. Carter took the time to attend the latest update for the Homeland Security Exercise and Evaluation Program. Mr. Carter was first certified on this program over 12 years ago so it was a good idea to refresh his knowledge base. Final inputs for the Okeechobee SQG program were completed and submitted to Tallahassee on May 21st & 22nd. As we continue to work forward on our Okeechobee full scale exercise we held a planning meeting on May 23rd. On May 24th we held a LEPC meeting at the American Compliance Technology (ACT) headquarters here in Bartow. As we close out the month it is only appropriate for us to take time to think of all the military members we have lost and to recognize their sacrifice on Memorial Day.

Tampa Bay LEPC staff was involved in a number of activities during the quarter. Staff attended the SERC quarterly meetings held at the Hilton DoubleTree in St. Augustine, on April 12-13, 2018. The quarterly Tampa Bay LEPC meeting was held on May 23rd at the offices of the Tampa Bay Regional Planning Council.

The Tampa Bay LEPC's HMEP Training Subcommittee also met on May 23rd. The mission of the meeting was to designate the remaining FY 2017-18 HMEP training funds pursuant to the current HMEP Contract.

The following constitutes the training expenses which, at minimum, will be (or has been) requested by the Tampa Bay LEPC in association with the FY 2017-18 HMEP Training Contract: attendance of 24 to the *2018 Hazmat Symposium*; attendance of firefighters to 160-Hr. *Hazmat Technicians Certification* courses (Hernando/ Manatee/Pasco); Registration fees (\$30 each) & Exam fees (\$42 each) for most firefighters taking the 160-Hr. *Hazmat Technician Certification* course this year across the District (Hernando/Hillsborough/Pasco/Pinellas); 40-Hr. *Shipboard Marine Firefighting* course (Hillsborough); three 8-Hr. "*The Art of Infrared Spectroscopy*" courses (Manatee); 40-Hr. *Hazmat Medic* course (Pinellas); one 8-Hr. *Hazmat IQ* course (Pinellas); three 8-Hr. *Riddle Me This* courses (Pinellas); one 16-Hr. *Hazmat Safety Officer/ Transportation* course (Hillsborough) and three 8-Hr. *Hazmat Competencies & Capabilities Assessment* course (Hernando).

HMEP Training expenses which will have been incurred by the Tampa Bay LEPC during this quarter were: a 160-Hr. *Hazmat Technician Certification* course/12 Students of Pasco County Fire Rescue (March 19th – May 18th); a 48-Hr. *Shipboard Marine Firefighting* course in Norfolk, VA/6 Students of Hillsborough County Fire Rescue (May 14-19); a 160-Hr. *Hazmat Technician Certification* course/60 Students of Hillsborough County Fire Rescue (March 18th – May 31st); three 8-Hr. *The Art of Infrared Spectroscopy* courses (June 12-14) in Manatee County; and a 40-Hr. *Hazmat Medic* course (June 25-29) in Pinellas County.

Tampa Bay LEPC staff will be submitting the revised Hazmat Team Self-Assessment survey to all eight local Hazmat Teams within the District, upon receipt, requesting their completion. Site visits will be conducted for the remaining Hazmat Teams which were not validated in 2017 by September 30, 2018 (i.e. Hillsborough County Fire Rescue, Southern Manatee Fire Rescue, Pasco County Fire Rescue and Pinellas County). Noting that all eight Tampa Bay Teams with full or partial hazmat team capabilities being assessed over a two-year period, this ambitious schedule clearly meets and exceeds the Florida State Fire College's request for assistance of the LEPCs to complete this task within their respective Districts over a "*three- to four-year period.*" It is anticipated that this schedule will continue to be administered at the prescribed rotational basis.

In terms of miscellany, LEPC staff and/or members additionally: attended the Port Tampa Bay's Safety & Risk Mitigation Summit at Tampa Cruiseship Terminal #2 (April 4th); submitted HMEP Quarterly Report and reimbursement request to FDEM for period of Jan. 1 - March 31, 2018 (April 5th); facilitated the (nearly) mon-thly meetings of the Pinellas Police Standards Council (April 11th & June 13th); attended the State Emergency Response Commission quarterly meetings in St. Augustine (April 12-13); attended the (nearly) monthly meetings of Ammonia Handlers/Operators (April 17th & May 29th);

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Submitted LEPC Quarterly Report and reimbursement request to FDEM for period of Jan. 1 - March 20, 2018 (April 18th); attended the bi-monthly meeting of the Tampa Bay Spill Committee (May 8th); attended the FDOH/Hernando County “Point of Dispensing” (POD) workshop (May 10th); participated in the Training Task Force Conference call (May 16th & June 13th); hosted the HMEP Training Subcommittee quarterly meeting (May 23rd); hosted the quarterly meeting of the Tampa Bay LEPC (May 23rd); submitted of the updated *Tampa Bay LEPC Hazardous Materials Emergency Response Plan* (by June 30th); and had the annual EPCRA notice published in the local newspapers with verification provided to FDEM (by June 30th).

Treasure Coast Local Emergency Planning Committee Activities

The last Treasure Coast Local Emergency Planning Committee (TCLEPC) meeting was held May 24, 2018 at Stuart Emergency Operations Center hosted by City of Stuart Fire Rescue, Stuart, Florida. The next scheduled meeting of the Treasure Coast LEPC is August 9, 2018, at City of Stuart Fire Rescue, Stuart, Florida.

Planning and Review:

During the last quarter staff reviewed past Shelter-In-Place projects and began updating the current power-point presentation with inclusion of new information. Current diorama scale model was worked on to allow for dry ice to be used as simulated gas in compartments to simulate incident for sheltering training. Staff has contacted school representatives and Boy Scout and Girl Scout companies to discuss shelter-in-place presentations for the next quarter.

Outreach Activities:

Staff reviewed the current outreach brochure and updated. Brochures will be distributed at outreach presentations this month. In addition, the current tabletop exercise planning committee was gathered for an initial planning conference. The Mid-term planning conference will take place June 26th. The tabletop will focus on hazmat response capabilities responding to a rural area of Palm Beach County.

Discussion topics will address response coordination between private and public response groups, shelter- in-place, hospital transport and decontamination. In the next quarter staff will contact Small and Large Quantity Generators (LQG) companies within the region to begin preparations for exercise planning workshops.

Hazardous Materials Emergency Preparedness (HMEP)

Training

During the last quarter, the TCLEPC sponsored two Hazardous Materials Incident Commander for Incidents at City of Stuart Fire Rescue May 22, 2018 and Indian River County Fire Rescue May 24, 2018. Classes requested are a 16-hr hands-on Methamphetamine Lab class and Chemical Suicide classes. As HMEP funds cannot be utilized for this training staff is discussing with instructors for no cost delivery. A rail car Chlorine leak control class and a toxicology class have also been requested.

Planning

During the last quarter the 2017/2018 Treasure Coast Regional Hazardous Materials Response Plan was reviewed for sectional information updates as well as inclusion of planning project and exercises results/outcomes

Hazards Analysis

The 2017/2018 Hazards Analysis Agreement for St. Lucie County was completed and submitted to and approved by Florida Division of Emergency Management (FDEM). County emergency management, hazardous materials teams and County fire chief were provided electronic copies of the CAMEOfm database for utilization in planning and response activities. Facilities in St. Lucie

that were visited for Tier II/E-Plan annual reporting compliance were notified of the availability of their individual analysis.

The South Florida LEPC held a regularly scheduled meeting on May 16 in Hollywood at the new offices of the South Florida Regional Planning Council. There were no membership changes at this meeting. The members were briefed on current training activities which, for the first time, included sponsoring two HazMat 160 classes. The Committee authorized the acquisition of a trailer to store and transport its hazmat training props around the District. All Monroe County Hazards Analyses were completed and submitted to the Division. The members approved the updated HazMat Plan for submission to FDEM. Beatriz Cabrera, Assistant Area Director for OSHA, presented her agency's findings on the January 16, 2017 Key Largo Storm Water Drainage System Incident, which resulted in three fatalities and one extremely severe injury.

Operation HeatShield2 was conducted April 28, bringing together multiple teams from throughout the Region. In addition to nine SWAT teams and three CSI/Forensics units, hundreds of patrol officers and firefighters/EMS also participated.

SUBJECT: Financial Status Report

SUMMARY: This memorandum presents information on the financial status of the Hazardous Materials Planning Program and the Risk Management Program (RMP) Program. Table I displays revenues received through annual fees and penalties by the two programs. The data for Fiscal Year FY 2015-2016, FY 2016-2017 and FY 2017-2018 through May 31, 2018 are provided for comparison.

Table II displays the budget and expenditures (by category) related to the Hazardous Materials Planning Program for FY 2016-2017 and FY 2017-2018 as of May 31, 2018. Table III presents the same financial information for the Risk Management Program.

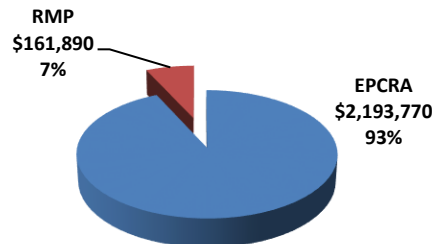

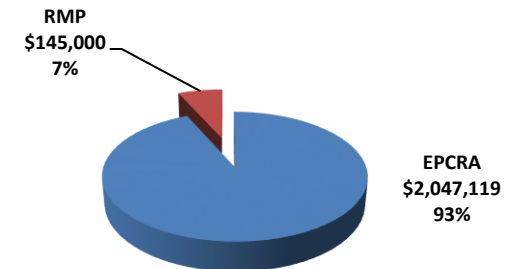

Allocation FY 2017-2018

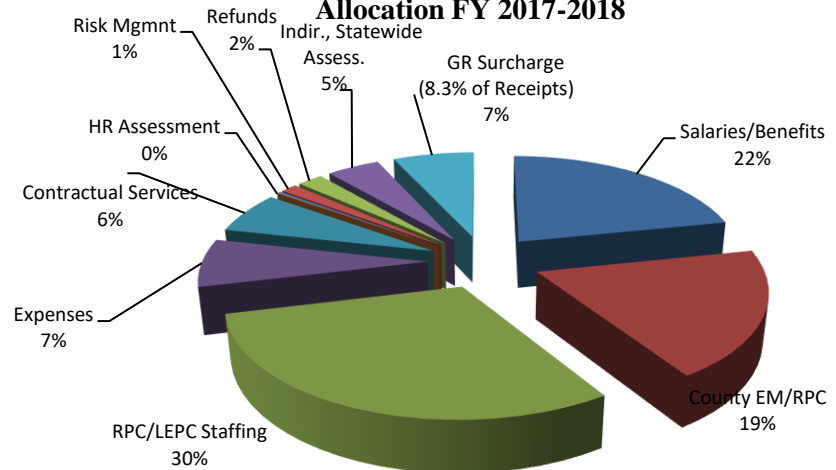

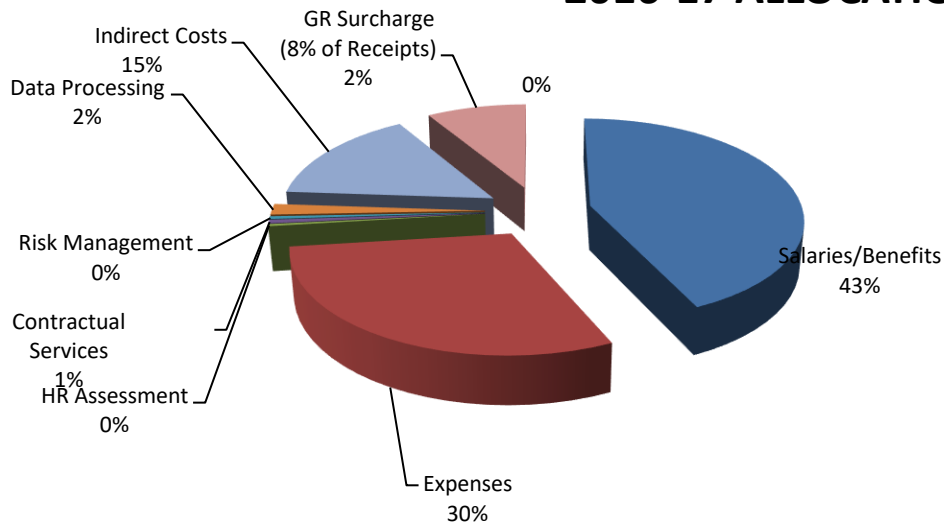

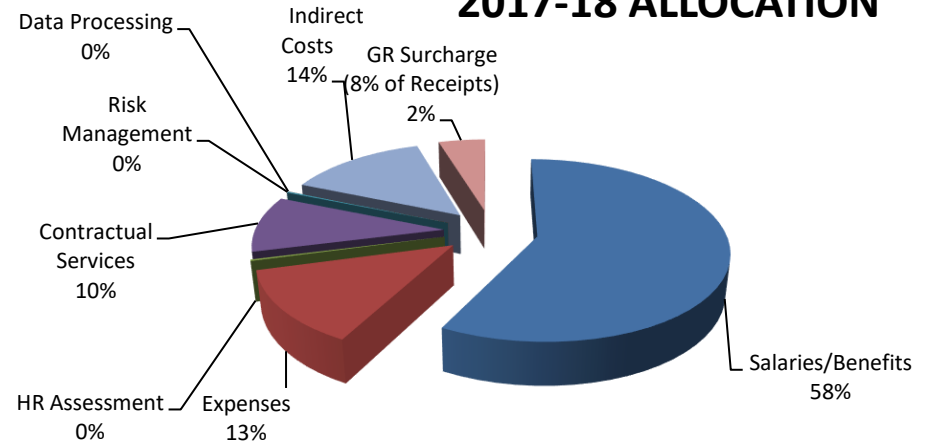

SUBJECT: Hazardous Materials Incidents Report

SUMMARY: The attached tables and graphs provide information on all hazardous materials incident reports received by the State Watch Office for the period of up to January 1, 2002 through May 31, 2018. Incident reports are reviewed by staff on a daily basis for compliance with Section 304 and other provisions of the Emergency Planning and Community Right-to-Know Act (EPCRA) program. They can also be used to identify facilities that may have an obligation to report under the Risk Management Planning (RMP) program.

The "Potential Section 304 Investigations" information in Table 1 is listed by Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) District. These are incidents involving the release of an Extremely Hazardous Substance (EHS) or a Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act (CERCLA) chemical at a fixed facility. In order for an incident to be covered under Section 304, the EHS or CERCLA chemical must meet or exceed its designated Reportable Quantity (RQ) and have potential for offsite exposure. Those facilities found not to be in compliance with all Section 304 reporting requirements are referred to the Division of Emergency Management's General Counsel for possible enforcement action. The incidents listed in Table 2 cover hazardous materials incidents for which evacuations, injuries and/or deaths were reported. Also note that the official cause of death is determined by the medical examiner's office. This process may take up to 90 days. The numbers for these tables were obtained from the State Watch Office incident reports, as well as other sources. This information is still being recorded and is available upon request.

The figures in Graph I show the total number of hazardous materials incidents per year (including Section 304) reported to the State Watch Office for the period of January 1, 2002 through May 31, 2018. The figures in Graph II compare incidents that occurred at fixed facilities to those involving transportation-related incidents during the past 12 months. Note that the incidents in Graph II have been further refined to list petroleum, LNG and propane incidents.

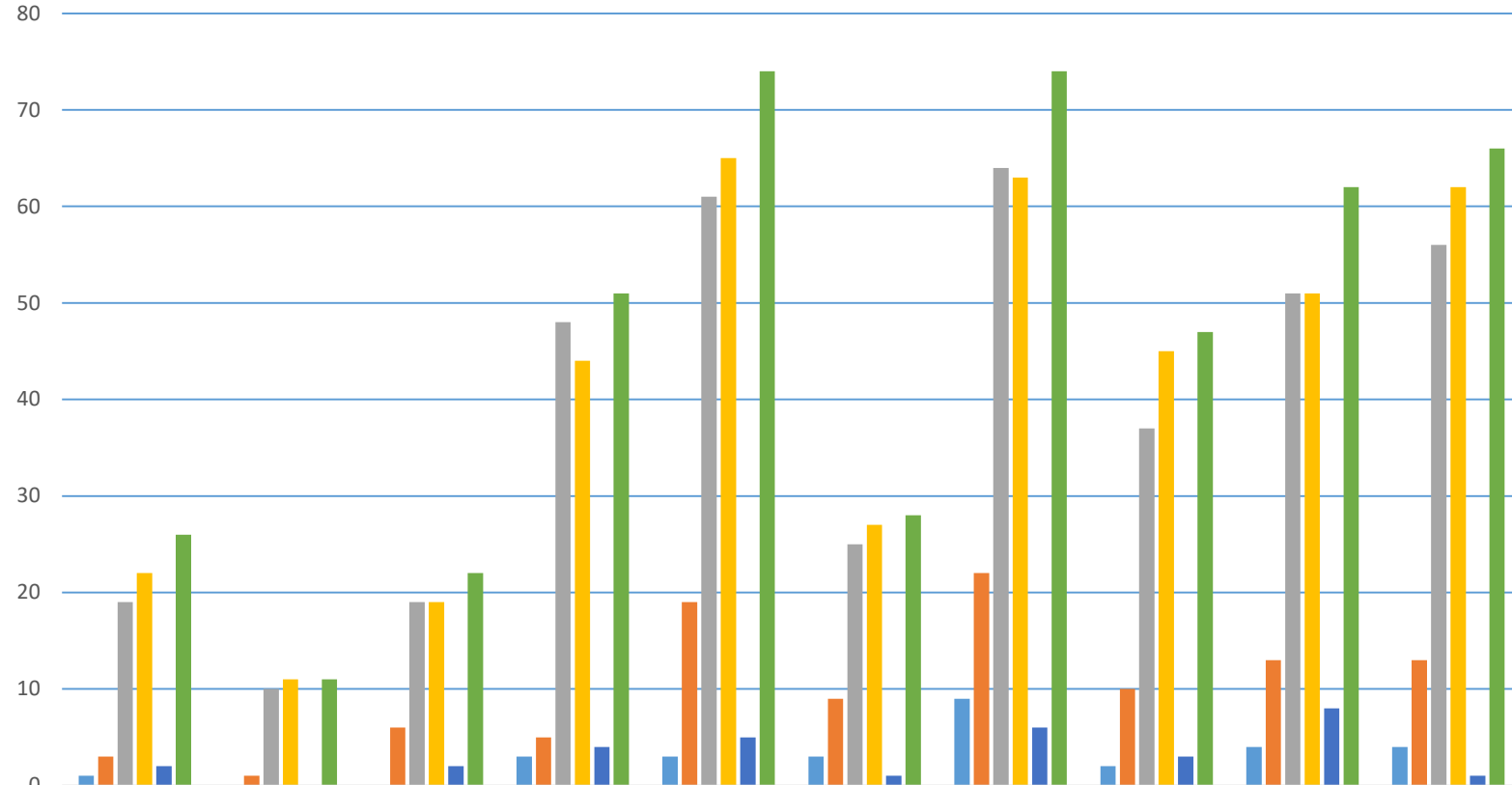

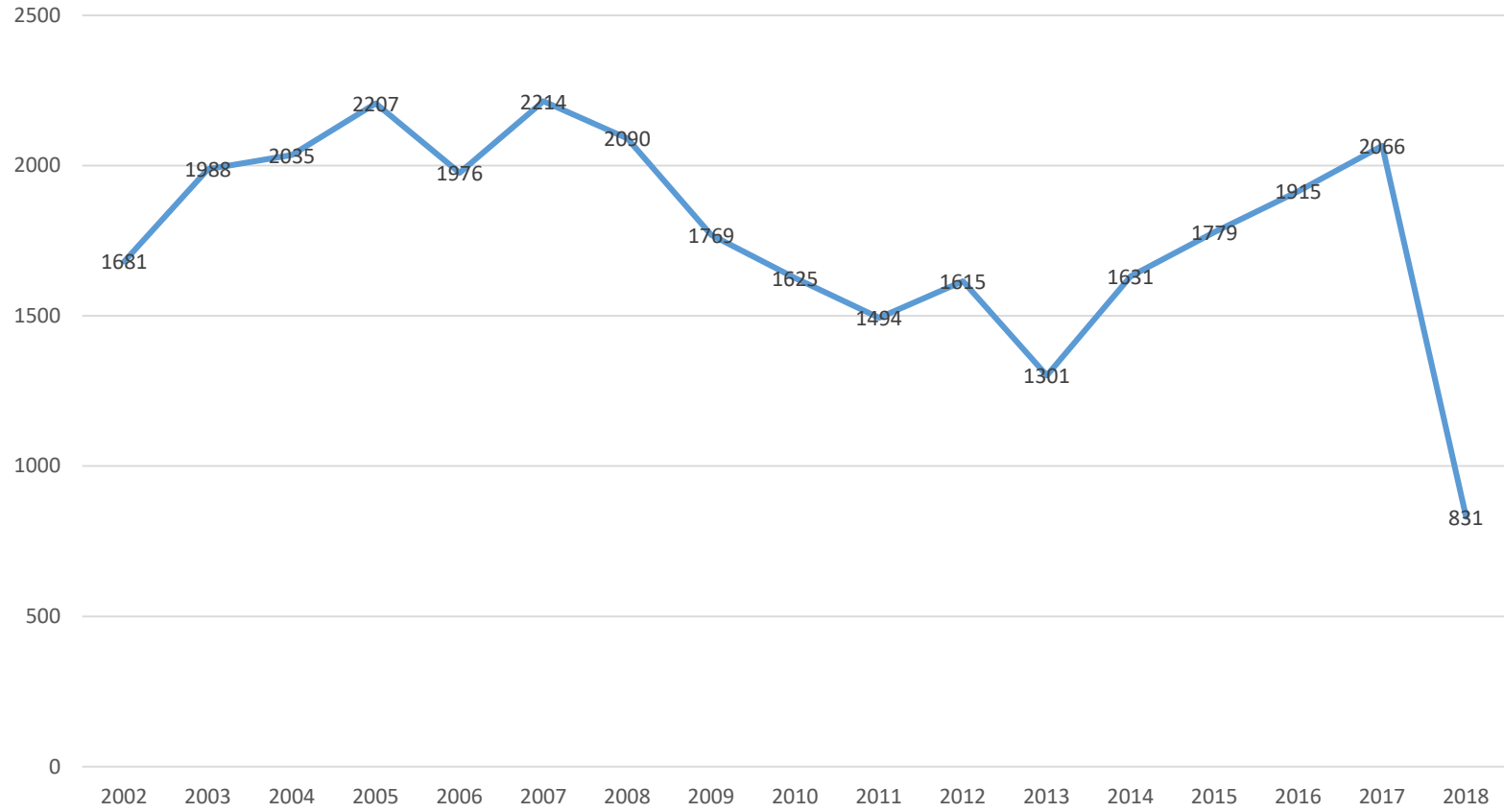

A. Meetings/Exercises/Activations

Staff participated in the statewide hurricane exercise (April 30 to May 3, 2018).

B. Verification

The total number of year 2017 Tier II reports in E-Plan is 11,679 (as of May 21, 2018). This total exceeds last year's total by more than 500 facilities. Staff is currently working on non-compliant facilities – estimated to be between 750 and 1,000 additional sites.

Staff is currently working with E-Plan and Bank of America staff to make it easier for filers to correctly calculate their annual fee as well as easier to make multiple payments. Also, working with E-Plan staff to make changes that will help staff find non-compliant facilities.

The attached graphs provide information on Tier II and various activities conducted by the verification staff. The "E-Plan Filing - Total Facility Count" by LEPC graph (see Graph I) displays the total number of facilities by LEPC that have year 2017 Tier 2 data in E-Plan (as of May 21, 2018). Graph II depicts the number of technical calls (per month) received by staff for the period of June 1, 2017 through May 31, 2018. Finally, Graph III depicts the total numbers of facilities & chemicals in E-Plan by year for the last seven reporting years (2011 through 2017).

For the period of March 1, 2018 through May 31, 2018, staff processed 1 refund application for \$ 525.00.

C. Risk Management Planning**Planning**

Staff provided outreach and technical assistance to 25 facilities and their staff. This was conducted by means 11 follow up post inspection. Six Risk Management Plan On-Site Inspections were performed. Staff completed eight final determination reports, nine desk audits and four document audits. Kevin Hardy and Eric Lott completed the EPA inspector certification training and attended the Chlorine Institute "Chlorep" weeklong training. We also attended Base Camp Survey training and performed 5 Base Camp Surveys in regions 3 and 2.

D. Radiological Emergency Preparedness (REP)

St. Lucie Nuclear Power Plant Practice Exercise was conducted on January 10, 2018 and the FEMA Evaluated Exercise was conducted on February 14, 2018. Region 4 & 6 AHIMT participated in both the Practice and FEMA Evaluated Exercises.

The State Emergency Operations Center was fully activated for both Exercises. FEMA's evaluation concluded that all objectives were met and all core capabilities were fulfilled. Further they stated the State "performed well."

Turkey Point Nuclear Power Plant Off Year Exercise was conducted on March 1st. Members of FDEM participated as the AHIMT. The Off Year Exercise was good. REP hosted FEMA who delivered 2 Courses: AWR-317 REP Core Concepts Course and MGT-445 REP Plume Plan Review. There were approximately 25 participants in both courses that was held at the State Emergency Operations Center.

REP Staff attended the Farley Ingestion Initial Planning Conference on March 14th in the morning and held the Florida Ingestion Pathway Task Force Meeting in the afternoon at Farley JIC. REP Staff and FEMA spoke with the Florida Ingestion Pathway Task Force about the importance of participating in the upcoming Farley Ingestion Pathway Exercise in October of 2018. FEMA agreed to conduct training and a table top exercise in Jackson County, Florida on September 26th.

REP Staff attended the AWR-351 REP Ingestion Core Concepts Course in Headland, AL on March 15th.

REP Staff updated the SEOC/IMT Nuclear Power Plant Emergency Responsibilities Flip Chart and has sent it out for publication.

REP Staff attended the Kennedy Space Center, NASA's 2020 Launch Kick Off Meeting on March 20-22, 2018.

FEMA conducted a Site Area Visit at the SEOC and met with REP Staff regarding Annual Letter of Certification (ALC), inspected radiological equipment and conducted a presentation on Reasonable Assurance Alignment Framework (RAFF).

The signed Annual Letter of Certification (ALC) for 2017 was submitted to FEMA.

REP Staff is currently developing a Radiological Emergency Response Training for Region 3 AHIMT to be conducted on June 20th and 21st at Clay County EOC.

E. Public Information/Technical Assistance

Staff handled technical assistance calls and provided outreach assistance calls totaling 2,485 for the period of March 1, 2018 through May 31, 2018.

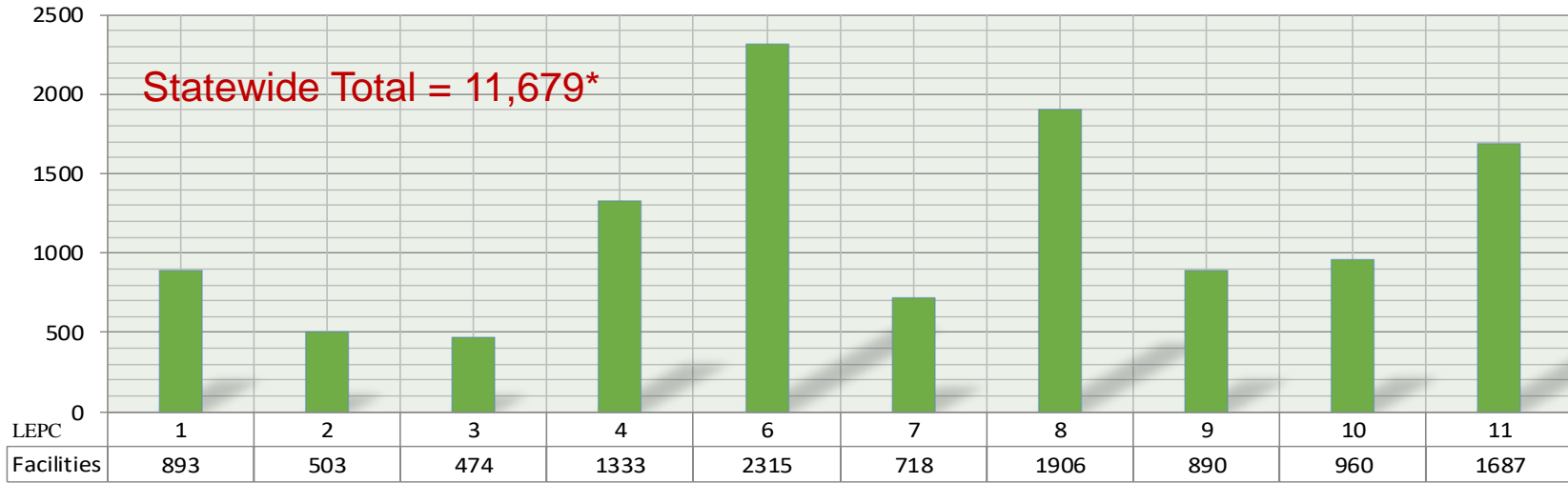
G. Notices

 BY LOCAL EMERGENCY PLANNING COMMITTEE DISTRICT

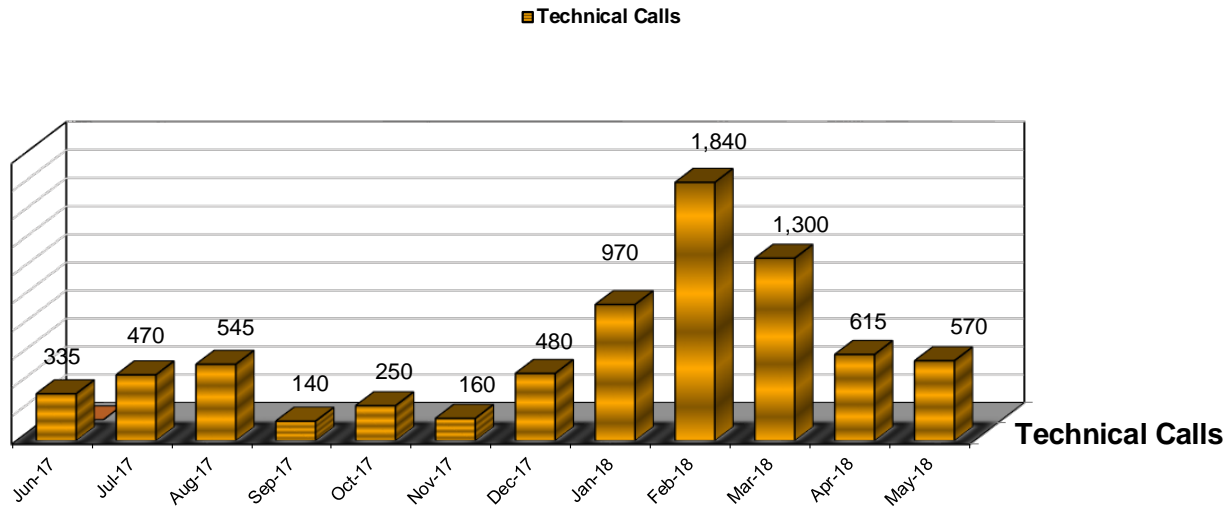
