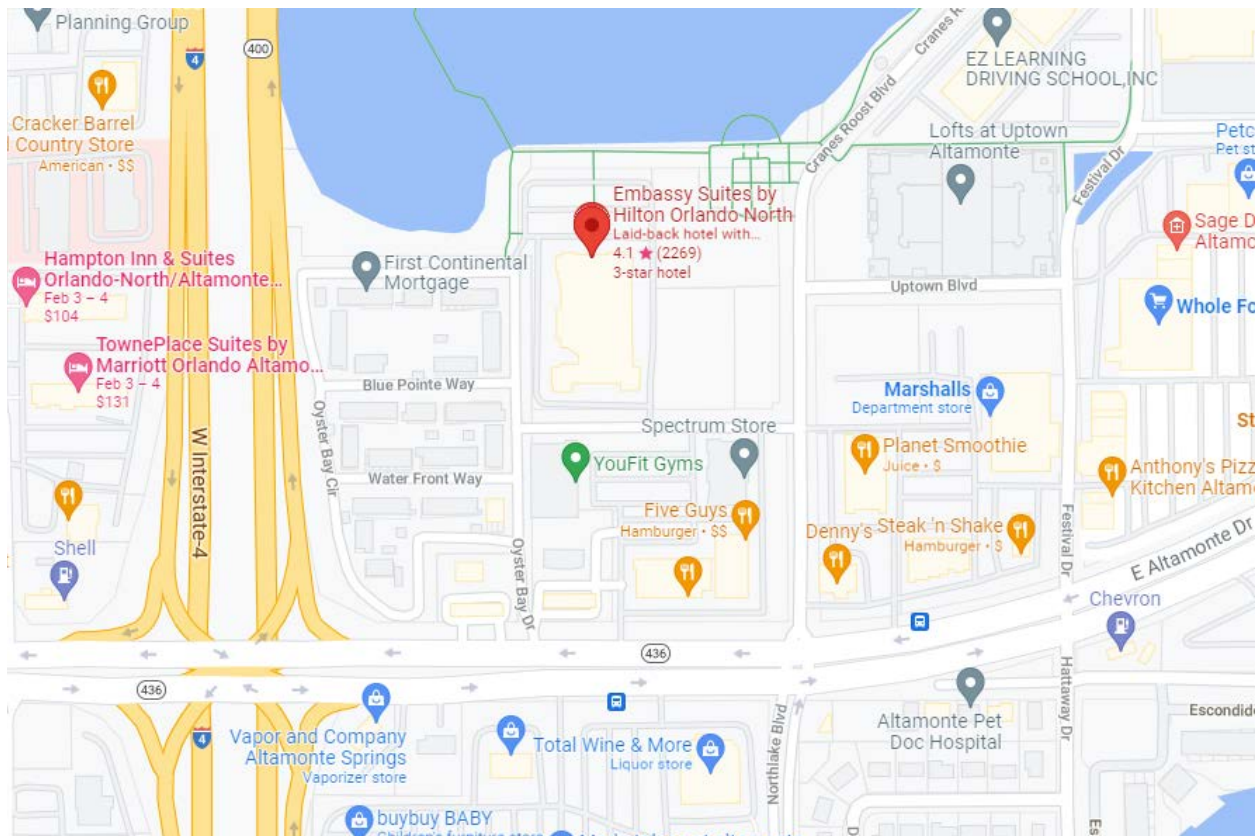

IV. Current Business

- Project Boxes- Mr. Dietrich discussed project boxes and the current TTF system utilizing SharePoint. The current process requires cleanup and ranking of the TTF on which projects are to move forward and which ones will be moved to the archives. Mr. Dietrich also discussed the possibility of utilizing another system if the TTF so chose. Staff will send current snapshot of project boxes to TTF for future discussion.
- Offshore Hazmat Pilot Program- Mr. Dietrich discussed the current status of the Offshore Hazmat initiative. Currently Nova University working through Resolve Marine are creating curriculum for a 2-3 day training event to be held in Ft Lauderdale in April. This pilot program will be evaluated by subject matter experts to help the TTF identify improvements that need to be made to this course. South Florida LEPC is providing 6 hazmat personnel for this course at the Resolve Marine training center. Additional information will be conveyed as the training curriculum and course are finalized.
- Hazmat Symposium- Chief Lamm discussed the current year hazmat symposium and the challenges of hold this event during covid. The hazmat symposium staff completed an incredible amount of work preparing for this event, all staff are volunteers and have been planning and working all year. Registration for this years event is high considering some city's and counties are not letting their responders travel. Strict protocols for cleaning, safety and PPE are in place to allow this event to continue in a safe and effective manner. Mr. Lamm went on to thank everyone for their continued support and the work everyone put into making this happen.

V. New Business

- Discussion from the group in regards to rule 69A-37.065 that requires training as part of the requirement to be a Florida Certified HAZMAT Technician. It causes problems for those that aren't firefighters, seeking certification, since the

HAZMAT 160 hour class does not cover basic use of fire gear. Those seeking task book completion and state certification do not have a way to get this, unless they take FF1 training. Mr. Scott Chappell stated the State Fire Marshal's (SFM) office does not have a process to recognize non firefighter HAZMAT certifications, because SFM's endorsement is not required for anyone other than firefighters. They can just meet OSHA 1910.120 and be recognized by the Authority Having Jurisdiction. Further discussion is needed during the next TTF conference call.

- Mr. Matt Marshall opened with discussion on NFPA 472 recent updates and the possibility of opening rule 69A-37.065. Group discussion agreed on creating a letter from our SERC to update this rule to include these updates. Recommendation to the LEPC during the SERC meeting to approve sending this letter.
- Mr. Pat Feagle discussed continuing to stress to departments and responders the HAZMAT Alert notification. This is an alert for hospitals that a patient is en route to the hospital that has been contaminated. IE: Organophosphate poisoning, or other types of contamination. EMS and Fire organizations working with hospitals will assist in avoiding cross contamination and allows the hospitals to prepare while following their protocols and/or notify their local hazmat teams for assistance in a timely manner if needed.

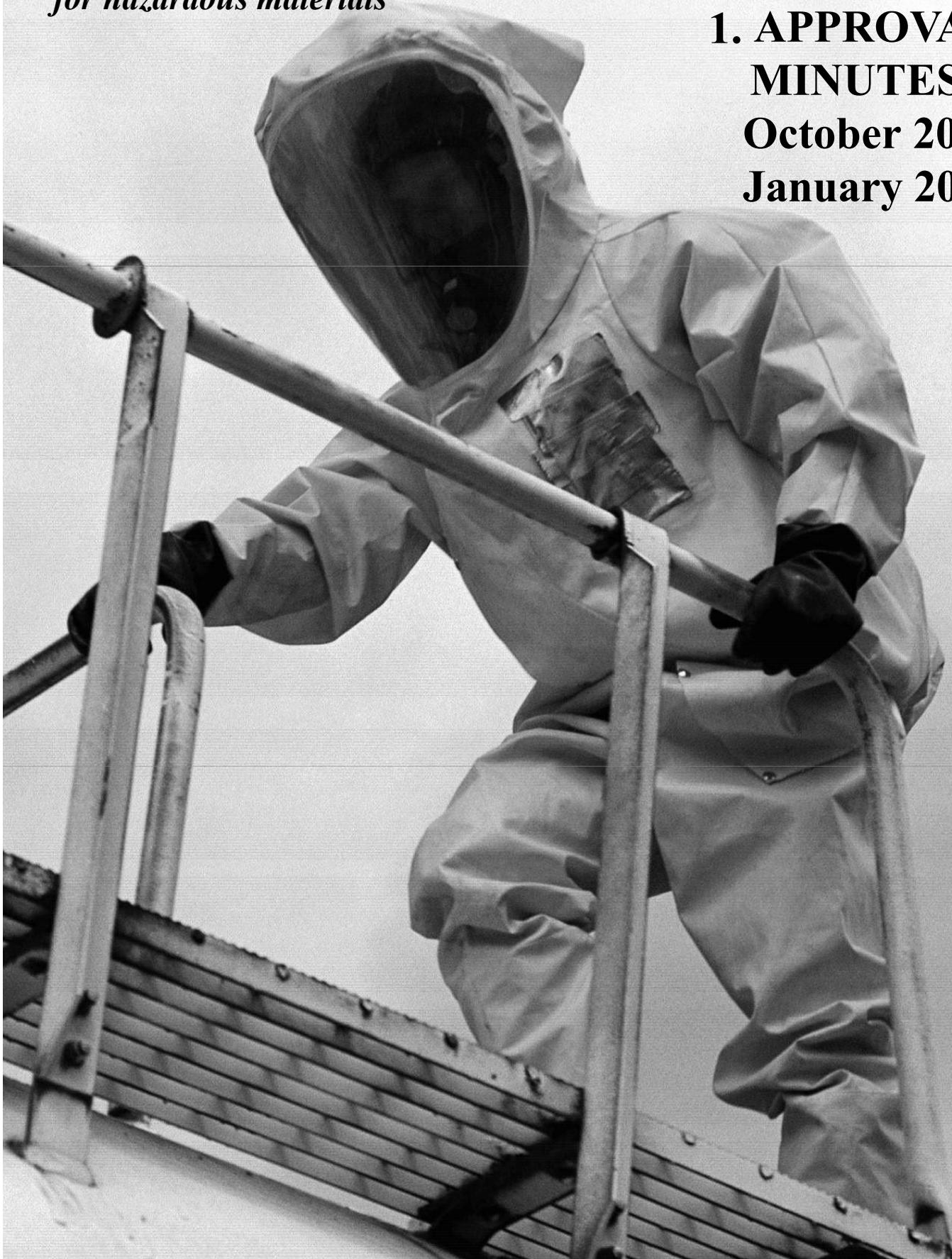

This fund also pays for all State HAZMAT activities, contracts, committees, and FDEM's technological hazards personnel salary. However, the trust fund is anticipated to fall below required levels in two years, A Legislative Budget Request has been submitted to move FDEM Tech hazards staff salaries to General Revenue instead of the Trust Fund, however if it is not accepted, changes will have to occur. The fees have remained the same since 1999, but costs and inflation have outpaced the fund. If want to be on SERC's Financial Committee, please contact Rob Dietrich.

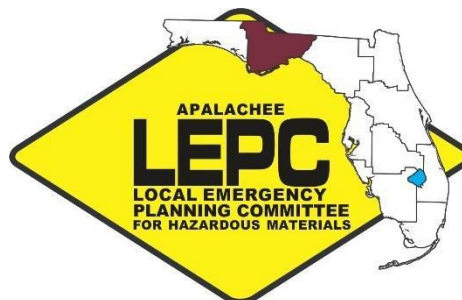

The Emerald Coast LEPC conducted several activities in the region from Dec 1, 2021-Feb 28, 2022, to increase compliance with the Emergency Planning and Community Right to Know Act (EPCRA) and to help prepare the community to respond to Hazardous Materials Incidents. EC LEPC:

- Met virtually on Feb 2, 2022.
- Held an LEPC Training Subcommittee meeting on December 3, 2021
- Members and/or staff attended DHS's Chemical Security Summit (virtually).
- Finished one 24-hour HAZMAT Operations (hybrid) class for Holmes Co that began in Q2.
- Provided six, 8-hour HAZMAT Technician Refresher courses for HAZMAT technicians.
- Began updating the LEPC's regional HAZMAT Plan. An LEPC's planning SC meeting is scheduled for March 30, 2022, to continue discussions.
- Held an EPCRA How-to-Comply Workshop (virtual) on January 26, 2022, for facility owner/operators, government agencies and the public.
- Sponsored 13 HAZMAT Technicians to attend the 2022 Florida HAZMAT Symposium.
- Members and staff attended the FL State Emergency Response Commission and its Training Task Force and LEPC Chairs-Coordinator's meetings in Daytona Beach (or virtually) on Jan 18-19, 2022.
- Sponsored 10 firefighters to attend the 160-hour HAZMAT Technician (Hybrid) course to recruit new HAZMAT techs for regional teams (Feb 14-March 26)
- Continued planning for a FDOH Suspicious Substance Sampling class for responders to be held March 2022.
- Continued planning to host FDOHs Intermediate and Advanced Radiological Operations for the region's HAZMAT Technicians to be held in April and September 2022.
- The next EC LEPC meeting is scheduled for April 2022.

Overview of the EC LEPC Feb 2, 2022, meeting:


The Emerald Coast Local Emergency Planning Committee (EC LEPC) and its subcommittees met on Feb 2, 2022, virtually. Members congratulated Capt. Tim Howard (Bay HAZMAT) and Shayne Stewart (FDOH) who were awarded the SERC's Thomas Yatabe Award. EC LEPC discussed a recent misunderstanding by a facility of LEPCs role. EC LEPC asked staff to develop a reply letter for use when facilities submit plans to EC LEPC that acknowledges receipt of their plan, asks them to include the 15 min EPCRA Notification (via a call to State Watch Office) and 7 day Written Follow-up letter (to SERC and LEPC) in their response plans, and to explain/clarify that EC LEPC is a planning, preparedness and information-based committee and not a response entity. LEPC does not control or direct HAZMAT response or assets.

EC LEPC also received a presentation from Taminco, a subsidiary of Eastman, on a release of trimethylamine that occurred on Dec 14th, 2021, that had exceeded the EPAs Reportable Quantity.

Staff also explained that State Watch Office incident notices are sometimes forwarded if it might be of interest to LEPC members (such as HAZMAT incident); however, these should not be relied on for response (such as by water facilities) who should get these from official means; LEPC is not 24/7 and notifications may not be timely or consistent. The AWIA act notifications for water facilities of HAZMAT incident in the region are being accomplished via a combination of: FDEM/SERC's HAZMAT Incident Tracker located

The workshop was held on Jan 26, 2022, from 1pm-3pm (Central). The workshop presented the requirements under EPCRA

applicable to businesses, and to local and state government planning efforts, as well as how citizens could obtain information on hazardous chemicals reported by individual facilities.

LEPC REGIONAL HAZMAT PLAN UPDATE

The Emerald Coast LEPC continued efforts related to the annual update of the regional HAZMAT Plan. EC LEPC's Planning Subcommittee will meet March 30^h to review plan changes. A draft plan will be presented to EC LEPC for its consideration in April 2022.

LEPC's are required under EPCRA Section 303 to develop a community hazardous materials plan for incidents at facilities with chemicals subject to EPCRA Section 302 (i.e., having Extremely Hazardous Substances).

Staff will be incorporating the suggested changes approved by the LEPC from the prior exercises, as well as be making format and other changes.

Training between Oct 1 and Dec 31, 2021, included six, 8 hour. HAZMAT technician refreshers held for Escambia, Bay, Ocean City Wright Fire Control District and Destin Fire Department. The training was submitted to the Florida State Fire College for continuing education credit for attending firefighters.

Additionally, LEPC finished up a 24 hr. HAZMAT Operations level (Hybrid) class for responders in the region. These classes are required for those that might respond to a HAZMAT incident.

EC LEPC also used Hazardous Materials Emergency Preparedness Grant funds to send ten firefighters to the 160-hour HAZMAT technician class to help the regional teams in recruiting and training new members. The EC LEPC also used grant funds to send 13 HAZMAT technicians in the region to the 2022 Florida HAZMAT Symposium, sponsored in part by the Florida State Emergency Response Commission.

APALACHEE LOCAL EMERGENCY PLANNING COMMITTEE

Serving Calhoun, Franklin, Gadsden, Gulf, Jackson, Jefferson, Liberty, Leon, and Wakulla counties

The Apalachee Local Emergency Planning Committee held its last meeting at the Tallahassee Fire Training Division on March 2, 2022. This meeting discussed current LEPC business and provided an opportunity for the members and interested parties to discuss needs, concerns and future LEPC endeavors.

In addition, the Apalachee LEPC reviewed and voted to approve the 2022 Apalachee Local Emergency Planning Committee Hazardous Materials Emergency Plan.

The next meeting of the Apalachee LEPC is tentatively scheduled for June 2022. All are welcome to attend.

The following is a summary of recent LEPC activities over the last quarter:

Hazardous Materials Training

Staff held one 4-Hour HAZWOPER and Awareness Course and one 8-Hour HAZWOPER Technician Refresher Course in Tallahassee this quarter. Staff attended and sponsored two people to attend the 2022 Hazardous Materials Symposium in Tallahassee. Staff also held an E-Plan Filing and EPCRA overview presentation on February 9, 2022. In addition, staff has distributed the following virtual training opportunities to Apalachee LEPC members and interested parties: *Steel Drum 101 Webinar for First Responders, Train the Trainer – Ethanol Emergency Response Webinar, Ethanol Safety & Steel Drum 101.*

Hazardous Materials Exercises

In coordination with Liberty County Emergency Management, staff held a regional hazardous material functional tabletop exercise on March 30, 2022, in Bristol. The scenario revolved around a chlorine release from a utility shed.

HMEP Planning Project

Staff continues work on the 2022 Commodity Flow Study as a part of the HMEP grant. The project began in January and will finish in August. Staff continues to work with with local public safety personnel as well as private sector partners to execute the project.

Hazard Analyses

Staff continues to work on the 2021-2022 Hazard Analyses site visits for the Apalachee region.

Public Outreach

Staff will attend the Jefferson County 2022 Build A Bag event in Monticello to present on best practices for sheltering-in-place and evacuation in the event of a hazardous material release.

Emergency Response Guides

Staff continues distributing hard copies of the 2020 Emergency Response guide. In addition to the hard copies, staff has been educating those interested in the use of the ERG application as a supplement to the hard copy edition.

During 2021 the opportunity to carry out the two planned tabletop exercises was delayed due to local government and agency directives that restricted travel of participating exercise players and evaluators. The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) Operations

Center and Freshco-Fort Pierce, LLC, will be choosing dates in 2022 to conduct both tabletop exercises.

Regional Coordination: The TCLEPC chair and coordinator, conduct and attend training, conference calls, and meetings regularly to provide technical assistance, LEPC and EPCRA education and outreach, and coordinate emergency planning, training, and exercises. Each quarter The TCLEPC Coordinator conducts a Regional Roundtable with the hazardous materials and/or Special Operations teams from each county to discuss current issues and threats, training and competency requirements, and exercises. The last meeting focused on the development of a regional training on monitoring and detection equipment from each county.

Statewide Coordination: staff attended the quarterly LEPC meetings conducted by the South, Southwest, East Central Florida, Apalachee, and Tampa Bay LEPCs. Staff serves as a member of the *Hazards Analysis Working Group* and attended the meeting conducted January 13, 2022, to discuss first responder access to facility information during response, quality assurance of E-Plan data for facilities, and future projects related to CAMEO and other potential planning initiatives.

Hazardous Materials Emergency Preparedness Grant (HMEP): The TCLEPC sponsored 42 students and one (1) Palm Beach County Hazards Materials Team to attend and compete at the 2022 Annual Hazmat Symposium held January 18-21, 2022, in Daytona Beach, Florida. The TCLEPC congratulates Palm Beach County hazmat team in winning third place in a field of seven teams in the leak control team competition. The TCLEPC also facilitated and sponsored one (1) *160hr Hybrid Hazardous Materials Technician Level* class conducted March-April 2022 in Delray Beach; sponsored 16 students to attend one (1) *Hazardous Materials Safety Officer training* (online delivery) in March 2022.

SUBJECT: Hazardous Materials Incidents Report

SUMMARY: The attached tables and graphs provide information on all hazardous materials incident reports received by the State Watch Office for the period of up to January 1, 2002 through February 28, 2022. Incident reports are reviewed by staff on a daily basis for compliance with Section 304 and other provisions of the Emergency Planning and Community Right-to-Know Act (EPCRA) program. They can also be used to identify facilities that may have an obligation to report under the Risk Management Planning (RMP) program.

The "Potential Section 304 Investigations" information in Table 1 is listed by Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) District. These are incidents involving the release of an Extremely Hazardous Substance (EHS) or a Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act (CERCLA) chemical at a fixed facility. In order for an incident to be covered under Section 304, the EHS or CERCLA chemical must meet or exceed its designated Reportable Quantity (RQ) and have potential for offsite exposure. Those facilities found not to be in compliance with all Section 304 reporting requirements are referred to the Division of Emergency Management's General Counsel for possible enforcement action. The incidents listed in Table 2 cover hazardous materials incidents for which evacuations, injuries and/or deaths were reported. Also note that the official cause of death is determined by the medical examiner's office. This process may take up to 90 days. The numbers for these tables were obtained from the State Watch Office incident reports, as well as other sources. This information is still being recorded and is available upon request.

The figures in Graph I show the total number of hazardous materials incidents per year (including Section 304) reported to the State Watch Office for the period of January 1, 2002 through February 28, 2022. The figures in Graph II compare incidents that occurred at fixed facilities to those involving transportation-related incidents during the past 12 months. Note that the incidents in Graph II have been further refined to list petroleum, LNG and propane incidents.

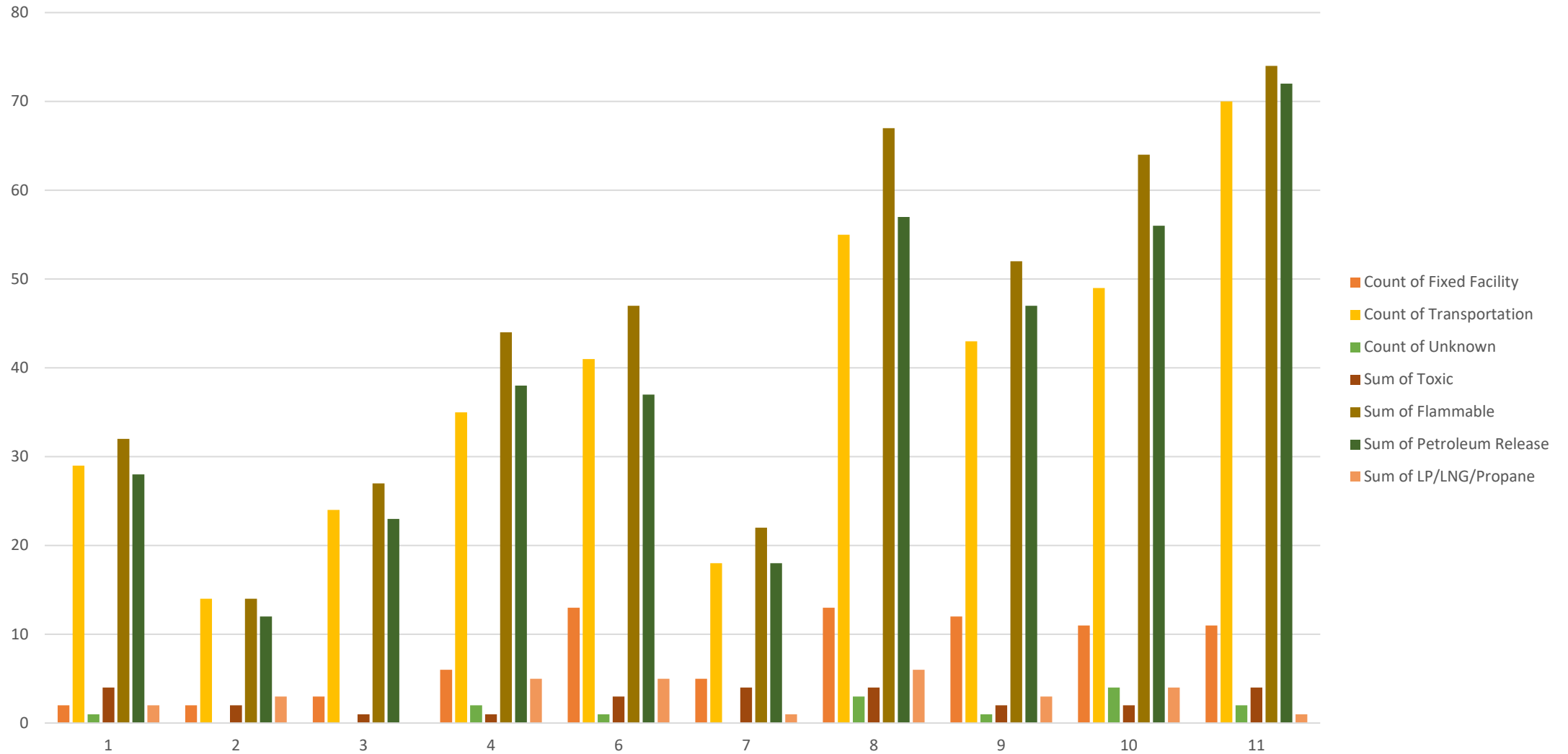

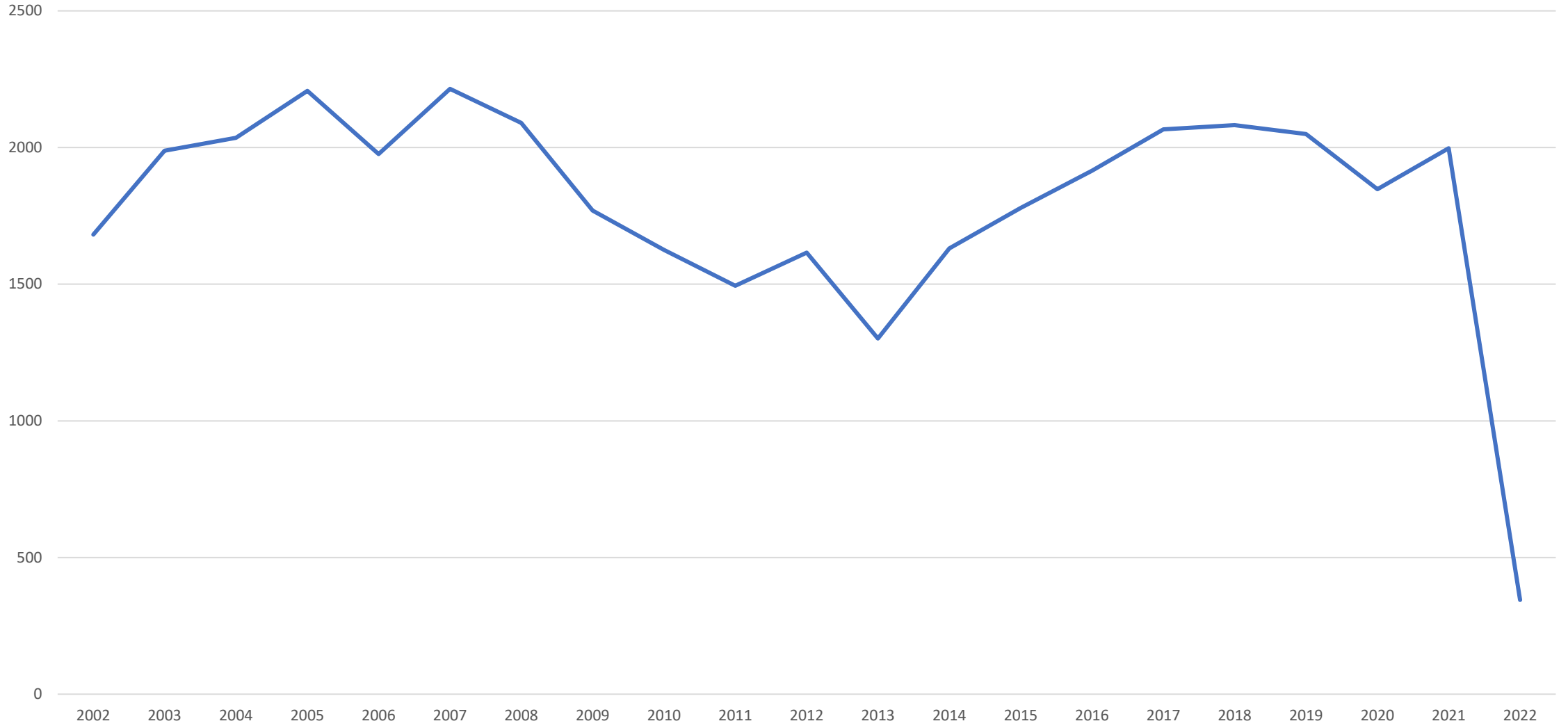

A. Tier II program: The total number of year 2021 Tier II reports in E-Plan is 12,196 (as of March 11, 2022). The total number of Tier II reports for year 2020 is currently listed as 12,718. The E-Plan Staff Tool “Not Filed Facilities” lists 1,112 sites that have a 2020 Tier II report with no corresponding year 2021 Tier II report filed in E-Plan. Staff will contact all facilities that have not filed for the current year.

The attached graphs provide information on Tier II and various activities conducted by the verification staff. The “E-Plan Filing - Total Facility Count” by LEPC graph (see Graph I) displays the total number of Tier II reports by LEPC for the reporting year 2021 (as of March 11, 2022). Graph II depicts the number of technical calls (per month) received by staff. Graph III depicts the total numbers of facilities & chemicals in E-Plan by year for the last seven reporting years (2015 through 2021). Graph IV shows the number of online payments for the last ten reporting years (2011 through 2021).

Staff handled technical assistance calls and/or provided outreach assistance calls totaling 953 for the period of December 1, 2021, through February 28, 2022.

C. Risk Management Planning Program

Staff provided outreach and technical assistance to 36 facilities and their staff. Staff completed 8 final determination reports, and 6 document/ 10 Desk audits.

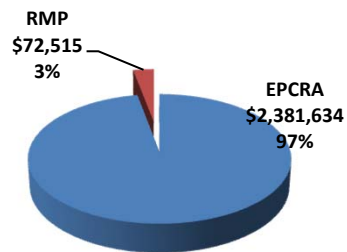
