#### What is Substantial Damage

 Substantial Damage under the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) is defined as damage of any origin sustained by a structure whereby the cost of restoring the structure to its before-damaged condition would equal or exceed 50 percent of the market value of the structure before the damage occurred



## Why is this important?

- To remain in compliance with the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP)
- If you do not maintain compliance
  - Risk probation and suspension from NFIP
  - Non-participating communities are not eligible for projects located within the floodplain under FEMA Public Assistance Categories C-G and HMGP
  - If in suspension, residents can no longer purchase NFIP Flood Insurance policies



## When do I have to do this?

- It needs to be documented before repairs begin
  - Residents typically begin repairs within 7 days of a disaster
- Communities need to collect this perishable data
  - This helps monitor repairs and development in the floodplain
  - Ensures NFIP compliance
- Additional support activities are eligible for up to 180 days after the community is declared for PA Category G



### Who is responsible?

- Local Building Official
- Local Floodplain Administrators
- Building Inspectors
- Building Code Enforcement
- Permit Reviews
- If local capacity is exceeded, communities may utilize a vendor or mutual aid



#### Category G Section 1206

- 1. Contact your FPA and Building Official and review your Substantial Damage Administrative Procedures
- 2. Request Data Analytics (NFIP Claims and Individual Assistance Data) from FEMA and sign the Information Sharing Agreement
- 3. Approximate the number of structures in the SFHA that are likely damaged and determine the number of teams and the length of time required to conduct SDEs
- 4. Determine if you have the internal capacity to complete these. If not, request assistance via mutual aid or vendor
- 5. Conduct SDEs
- 6. Send letters to residents informing them of Substantial Damage Determinations
- 7. Monitor development within the floodplain (SFHA) to ensure enforcement actions were taken
- 8. Complete any necessary work
- 9. Gather documentation for PA project and process accordingly within 180 days after the declaration



#### What is eligible?

- Review and process applications for building permits; certificates of occupancy; certificates of compliance; construction documents
  - Compliance with federal, state, and municipal building, housing, and life-safety codes and standards applicable to disaster-related repair, replacement, or retrofit
- Process requests for building code variances and monitor impacted areas for unpermitted construction activities
- Contract for services and collect fees
- Provide training and outreach to the public on building code and permit requirements
- Inspect structures under construction for compliance with approved plans, specifications, and all requirements of applicable codes, laws, and ordinances, along with reviewing and issuing elevation certificates



#### What is eligible?

- Identify and carry out corrective action in cases where construction, design, and occupancy do not comply with codes and/or ordinances
- Conduct and process condemnation determinations
- Enforce or administer standards for development according to community floodplain management regulations
- Process permits for disaster-related development in the floodplain
- Perform inspections to ensure compliance with repair and substantial damage construction requirements
- Review, adjudicate, and resolve Substantial Damage Determination appeals



#### Hurricane Helene Options

- 1. Conduct your own Substantial Damage Estimates and related activities with local staff and submit for reimbursement under PA Category G
- 2. Properly procure a vendor or mutual aid to augment local staff to conduct these activities and submit for reimbursement under PA Category G
- 3. Submit a mission request to the State
  - State will assign vendors to complete the Substantial Damage Estimates to work with local officials to complete work
  - State will cover the match
  - Will require a Memorandum of Understanding
  - Will require a high degree of coordination and communication among the communities and the State



- Submit a mission request for assistance with Substantial Damage Estimates and related work
- Mission request should include:
  - Which activities you need assistance with (i.e. substantial damage estimates, permit reviews, inspections, etc.)
  - How many structures are damaged within the SFHA
- FDEM Staff will then reach out to collect some additional information about
  - Which system you will be using to complete the SDEs
  - Where and when teams should report
  - Locations to send teams to conduct SDEs, permit reviews, inspections, etc.
