CRC EHP Completeness Checklist Emergency Work

Per PAPPG V 4.0 pg. 98, the Applicant should provide the following documentation to facilitate the EHP review for Emergency Work (Category A and B):

Site Map containing geographical coordinates in latitude/longitude (in decimal degrees) for all locations where work will be performed
Dates of construction
Photographs of facilities within the project area
Any known environmental issues or historic preservation concerns e.g., floodplain/wetlands, asbestos present within a facility, protected species, located in an archaeologically sensitive area, etc.
Environmental Assessments
Historic property designations/surveys, including archaeological surveys
Copies of permits and correspondence with regulatory agencies

<u> Category A – Debris</u>

Debris projects can have many factors that might cause an environmental impact. Florida Division of Emergency Management (FDEM) recommends Applicants to have a Debris Management Plan (DMP). Having a DMP can streamline an Applicant's debris removal process and EHP review because final disposal sites and disposal method would be pre-identified. While debris removal is usually statutorily excluded from NEPA review, the Applicant still needs to comply with all environmental laws and regulations.

Potential environmental/historic issues to consider:

Debris:

Occurred in a Floodplain

Occurred in a Wetland

Occurred in an area with endangered or threatened species

Could impact important archaeological, cultural, or historic resources

Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) has authorized all Disaster Debris Management Sites (DDMS) need to be authorized or preauthorized by FDEP

Authorization from the Florida Forest Service to open pile burning of debris

For vegetative debris:

	Entity that disposed of the debris
	Entity's location
	WACS ID of DDMS
	Final disposal site
	How debris was disposed
	Copies of any permits or notices of no permit needed documentation
For hazardous waste:	

Disposal occurred at a FDEP permitted facility

Category B – Emergency Protective Measures

Emergency protective measure projects are usually statutorily excluded from NEPA review. Again, this does not mean category B projects are exempt from following federal, state, or local environmental/ historic preservation laws.

Potential environmental/ historic issues to consider include:

Emergency protective measures:

Occurred in a floodplain

Occurred in a wetland

Occurred in an area with endangered or threatened species

Could impact important archaeological, cultural, and historic resources

For beaches eligible for emergency sand placement (emergency berm):



Sand meets environmental regulations

For hazardous materials* (if present)

Applicant complied with all Federal, State, and local environmental laws
